We're on a selective journey through syntax. The aim of this journey is that you'll be able to recognize and name syntactic phenomena, and identify and construct such phenomena in a language of your choice; you'll have some general background in syntactic theories and cross-linguistic patterns that lets you identify specifically interesting constructions, constructions that challenge existing theories or corroborate their extend; you'll be able to understand theories that analyse these phenomena and make predictions based on them, and you'll be able to come up with possible structural analyses of sentences on the fly; as such, you'll make steps towards reaching a syntactic auto-pilot, that constantly scans what you hear and say and that reacts when you come across a sentence for which you cannot find a meaningful analysis.

The subject matter that you'll be acquiring these skills by is mostly the field of word order. The nice thing about word order is that every language has one, and so you can investigate it in every language (in contrast, there is not much to research in terms of morphological agreement in, say, Mandarin). The theoretical problem that we'll focus on is that word order doesn't directly inform you about constituency and hierarchical structure most of the time. Therefore, we have to find ways to gain access to the hierarchical structure of sentences. Before we can do that, we'll first have to learn to thoroughly control for influences of information structure. I will encourage you to work on your native language or the language of your choice. I also encourage you to contribute to our ongoing project "Consequences of Head Argument Structure for Syntax" of our SFB1287. We lay the groundwork for empirical investigations as we venture through the term, constructing items and preparing syntactic fieldwork for each phenomenon we cover as we go. In order to show that you've acquired the skills we set out to acquire, you'll prepare a handout documenting your syntactic fieldwork. This prepares you for what research in a group is like: you first discuss what you want to investigate, then you gather the data, and finally you present them to your peers.

As far as the mode of meeting is concerned: We'd start out completely offline, but please let me know in advance if you already know that you don't want to or cannot attend in person. It's university policy that we are to maximize the amount of time taught "in presence". On the other hand, I still haven't caught Covid and I'd love to keep it that way. So I am very torn on this topic and we can settle on a modus operandi in the first weeks. But still let me know your standing in advance to get an early picture of the situation!

Course Begin: 26 April 2022 !!! In this course, students will become acquainted with the first theoretical and practical steps in doing linguistic fieldwork. The course offers a mixture of theoretical and practical components. In the theoretical part of the course (mainly in the first part), we will look at the do's and don'ts of good fieldwork practice and fieldwork methods in phonology, morphology, syntax and semantics. In the practical classes, students will start eliciting their own data with native speaker consultants, followed by recurrent feedback-loops. This work will continue in the more practical second class of the module in the winter semester when students can look at specific phenomena in more detail. Target languages (yet to be determined, depending on number of students and availability of informants): Ukrainian, Finnish, or Igbo. Kommentar

This Masters course examines real-time grammatical processing in a non-native language (L2), focusing on sentence-level phenomena. Specific questions to be explored include the following: What role does the ability to process the input play in L2 acquisition? Do non-native speakers process the L2 input in the same way as native speakers of the target language do? If not, what are the differences? Which individual-difference variables affect non-native speakers' processing of the L2? How can L2 processing behaviour be accounted for by existing psycholinguistic models of language processing?

Voraussetzung

This course builds on my basic-level course Second Language Acquisition (BM4) and presupposes a good basic grounding in L2 acquisition, and in grammatical theory and description. Some familiarity with current issues, models and methods used in experimental language processing research is desirable.

This course provides an overview of studies investigating the representation and processing of complex words in the human brain. We will first examine knowledge and use of morphology in different kinds of special populations focusing on people with acquired brain disorders (aphasia) and people with neuro-degenerative diseases (Parkinson's, Alzheimer's). We will then discuss results from studies using electrophysiological and brain-imaging studies on healthy monolingual and multilingual individuals. Empirical findings will be evaluated from a linguistic perspective, focusing on how evidence from brain studies on language bears on notions and concepts of the theory of language.
