- raise awareness of and practise the suprasegmental features of English, including stress and intonation patterns, as well as connected speech
- learn how to identify interference from one's native language and develop skills for speaking intelligibly
- recognize and comprehend a variety of accents to navigate different communicative contexts
- discuss relevant topics with the goal of engaging in meaningful discourse in different contexts (e.g. presentations and interviews)
- gain insight into the interconnection between pronunciation and non-verbal behaviour in conveying and interpreting meaning, particularly when giving academic presentations.

Kommentar

This is the first part of a two-course module which lays the groundwork for all further coursework in English linguistics. It aims to introduce students to the nature of language and the major domains of linguistic inquiry as well as its basic concepts, principles and tools in the following areas: Phonetics, Phonology, Morphology and Lexical Semantics. Students will

- excerpt the relevant knowledge from course-specific online material and/or literature on the basis of guiding questions,
- test their understanding by applying their newly acquired knowledge to exercise questions,
- clarify questions in class, and
- complete assignments

in order to later be able to use these skills in the advanced linguistics courses in their BA and MA studies.

There will be quizzes and a mock exam.

Please note that this course is offered by different instructors on different time slots every week.

Tutorials (which provide you with further practice) will be announced at the beginning of the semester. It is strongly recommended that students attend one of these tutorials regularly.

We strongly recommend attending this course in parallel with part II.

Kommentar

Captivity narratives are regarded as one of the earliest American genres (within the settler colonial narrative tradition), proliferating between the 17th and 19th centuries. The texts we will read in this class are a vital part of American literature and were influential in subsequent literary creation and national culture. The narratives were filtered through different religious denominations, functioning as catalytic texts that reinforced institutionalized beliefs. In representing disparate cultural systems, captivity narratives were an important vehicle for community formation. In the seminar, we will trace the development and changes of these narratives from early Puritan texts to contemporary adaptations. We will examine the redefinition of this genre, which, in its broadest sense, has come to include slave narratives as well as alien abduction stories.

Kommentar

The Humboldt Forum in Berlin is a highly contested institution of cultural memory organization and knowledge production. While long-standing critiques of the forum have engaged with Germany's colonial legacy in the context of, e.g., restituting the Benin bronzes or the display of the Papuan 'Luf-boat', in this class, we will turn our attention to the so-called North American exhibitions. These ethnological exhibitions have received relatively little public and scholarly attention within decolonization debates. Indeed, settler colonialism in North America is often framed as an 'un-German' matter that takes place 'over there', across the pond, and can thus be investigated from a supposedly detached 'outsider' perspective. Yet, these ethnological exhibitions are key to understanding Germany's implicatedness in settler colonialism in North America, both in material and narrative terms: such an understanding includes the removal of material belongings from Indigenous nations, often under structural conditions of duress (e.g. the Potlatch ban), for European collections (such as the Berliner Museum für Völkerkunde), as well as the power hierarchies that underpin matters of repatriation. It further includes the institution's complicity in perpetuating harmful narratives about history, land, colonization, and Indigeneity, as museums frequently reproduce stories of seemingly inevitable land and cultural loss in the face of the nation-state's 'progress', while their own "Indianthusiasm" (Lutz) goes largely unquestioned. Such a narrative distorts the realities of genocide and, in a self-serving manner, justifies museal practices of 'salvaging' and preserving material belongings of 'disappearing' cultures.

What does it then mean to read North America through and against the Humboldt Forum? What kind of situated reading practices does such an endeavor call for? On the one hand, how can we in this class work to dismantle the institution's colonial structures, practices, and stories embedded in its politics and ethics? On the other hand, how can we attend to forms of disruption, intervention, and alternative museal practices within and outside of the institution that complicate and refuse its colonial ways of seeing and knowing? And what is the role of literature when engaging with these questions?

These are some of the key questions that we will tackle in this class focusing on two case studies: first, we will visit the "[Ts'uu Cedars: Of Trees and People](#)" exhibition, currently on display in the Humboldt Forum and co-curated by Daniela Kratzsch (Berlin-based) and Sean Young (Haida). Second, we will read Beth Piatote's (Nez Perce) play *Antikoni* that adapts Sophocles' Greek tragedy and places it in a contemporary US-American museal and legal context. Bringing together museum studies and literary studies, this class aims to give students the opportunity to practice their analytical skills by engaging both with an exhibition as a cultural text and with drama as another, literary, text form.

Our discussions will demand careful attention to situated knowledge (production) and the role of the reader/viewer as a co-producer of meaning. Students should be ready to approach the texts and exhibition with open-mindedness in order to challenge and critically rethink their own assumptions, and to join in a shared, respectful process of reflection and learning. To do so, students are asked to complete the readings and participate in in-class discussions.

Kommentar

Captivity narratives are regarded as one of the earliest American genres (within the settler colonial narrative tradition), proliferating between the 17th and 19th centuries. Kommentar

The Humboldt Forum in Berlin is a highly contested institution of cultural memory organization and knowledge production. While long-standing critiques of the forum have engaged with Germany's colonial legacy in the context of, e.g., restituting the Benin bronzes or the display of the Papuan 'Luf-boat', in this class, we will turn our attention to the so-called North American exhibitions. These ethnological exhibitions have received relatively little public and scholarly attention within decolonization debates. Indeed, settler colonialism in North America is often framed as an 'un-German' matter that takes place 'over there', across the pond, and can thus be investigated from a supposedly detached 'outsider' perspective. Yet, these ethnological exhibitions are key to understanding Germany's implicatedness in settler colonialism in North America, both in material and narrative terms: such an understanding includes the removal of material belongings from Indigenous nations, often under structural conditions of duress (e.g. the Potlatch ban), for European collections (such as the Berliner Museum für Völkerkunde), as well as the power hierarchies that underpin matters of repatriation. It further includes the institution's complicity in perpetuating harmful narratives about history, land, colonization, and Indigeneity, as museums frequently reproduce stories of seemingly inevitable land and cultural loss in the face of the nation-state's 'progress', while their own "Indianthiasm" (Lutz) goes largely unquestioned. Such a narrative distorts the realities of genocide and, in a self-serving manner, justifies museal practices of 'salvaging' and preserving material belongings of 'disappearing' cultures.

What does it then mean to read North America through and against the Humboldt Forum? What kind of situated reading practices does such an endeavor call for? On the one hand, how can we in this class work to dismantle the institution's colonial structures, practices, and stories embedded in its politics and ethics? On the other hand, how can we attend to forms of disruption, intervention, and alternative museal practices within and outside of the institution that complicate and refuse its colonial ways of seeing and knowing? And what is the role of literature when engaging with these questions?

These are some of the key questions that we will tackle in this class focusing on two case studies: first, we will visit the "[Ts'uu Cedars: Of Trees and People](#)" exhibition, currently on display in the Humboldt Forum and co-curated by Daniela Kratzsch (Berlin-based) and Sean Young (Haida). Second, we will read Beth Piatote's (Nez Perce) play *Antikoni* that adapts Sophocles' Greek tragedy and places it in a contemporary US-American museal and legal context. Bringing together museum studies and literary studies, this class aims to give students the opportunity to practice their analytical skills by engaging both with an exhibition as a cultural text and with drama as another, literary, text form.

Our discussions will demand careful attention to situated knowledge (production) and the role of the reader/viewer as a co-producer of meaning. Students should be ready to approach the texts and exhibition with open-mindedness in order to challenge and critically rethink their own assumptions, and to join in a shared, respectful process of reflection and learning. To do so, students are asked to complete the readings and participate in in-class discussions.

Kommentar

The Humboldt Forum in Berlin is a highly contested institution of cultural memory organization and knowledge production. While long-standing critiques of the forum have engaged with Germany's colonial legacy in the context of, e.g., restituting the Benin bronzes or the display of the Papuan 'Luf-boat', in this class, we will turn our attention to the so-called North American exhibitions. These ethnological exhibitions have received relatively little public and scholarly attention within decolonization debates. Indeed, settler colonialism in North America is often framed as an 'un-German' matter that takes place 'over there', across the pond, and can thus be investigated from a supposedly detached 'outsider' perspective. Yet, these ethnological exhibitions are key to understanding Germany's implicatedness in settler colonialism in North America, both in material and narrative terms: such an understanding includes the removal of material belongings from Indigenous nations, often under structural conditions of duress (e.g. the Potlatch ban), for European collections (such as the Berliner Museum für Völkerkunde), as well as the power hierarchies that underpin matters of repatriation. It further includes the institution's complicity in perpetuating harmful narratives about history, land, colonization, and Indigeneity, as museums frequently reproduce stories of seemingly inevitable land and cultural loss in the face of the nation-state's 'progress', while their own "Indianthiasm" (Lutz) goes largely unquestioned. Such a narrative distorts the realities of genocide and, in a self-serving manner, justifies museal practices of 'salvaging' and preserving material belongings of 'disappearing' cultures.

What does it then mean to read North America through and against the Humboldt Forum? What kind of situated reading practices does such an endeavor call for? On the one hand, how can we in this class work to dismantle the institution's colonial structures, practices, and stories embedded in its politics and ethics? On the other hand, how can we attend to forms of disruption, intervention, and alternative museal practices within and outside of the institution that complicate and refuse its colonial ways of seeing and knowing? And what is the role of literature when engaging with these questions?

These are some of the key questions that we will tackle in this class focusing on two case studies: first, we will visit the "[Ts'uu Cedars: Of Trees and People](#)" exhibition, currently on display in the Humboldt Forum and co-curated by Daniela Kratzsch (Berlin-based) and Sean Young (Haida). Second, we will read Beth Piatote's (Nez Perce) play *Antikoni* that adapts Sophocles' Greek tragedy and places it in a contemporary US-American museal and legal context. Bringing together museum studies and literary studies, this class aims to give students the opportunity to practice their analytical skills by engaging both with an exhibition as a cultural text and with drama as another, literary, text form.

Our discussions will demand careful attention to situated knowledge (production) and the role of the reader/viewer as a co-producer of meaning. Students should be ready to approach the texts and exhibition with open-mindedness in order to challenge and critically rethink their own assumptions, and to join in a shared, respectful process of reflection and learning. To do so, students are asked to complete the readings and participate in in-class discussions.

Kommentar

The Humboldt Forum in Berlin is a highly contested institution of cultural memory organization and knowledge production. While long-standing critiques of the forum have engaged with Germany's colonial legacy in the context of, e.g., restituting the Benin bronzes or the display of the Papuan 'Luf-boat', in this class, we will turn our attention to the so-called North American exhibitions. These ethnological exhibitions have received relatively little public and scholarly attention within decolonization debates. Indeed, settler colonialism in North America is often framed as an 'un-German' matter that takes place 'over there', across the pond, and can thus be investigated from a supposedly detached 'outsider' perspective. Yet, these ethnological exhibitions are key to understanding Germany's implicatedness in settler colonialism in North America, both in material and narrative terms: such an understanding includes the removal of material belongings from Indigenous nations, often under structural conditions of duress (e.g. the Potlatch ban), for European collections (such as the Berliner Museum für Völkerkunde), as well as the power hierarchies that underpin matters of repatriation. It further includes the institution's complicity in perpetuating harmful narratives about history, land, colonization, and Indigeneity, as museums frequently reproduce stories of seemingly inevitable land and cultural loss in the face of the nation-state's 'progress', while their own "Indianthusiasm" (Lutz) goes largely unquestioned. Such a narrative distorts the realities of genocide and, in a self-serving manner, justifies museal practices of 'salvaging' and preserving material belongings of 'disappearing' cultures.

What does it then mean to read North America through and against the Humboldt Forum? What kind of situated reading practices does such an endeavor call for? On the one hand, how can we in this class work to dismantle the institution's colonial structures, practices, and stories embedded in its politics and ethics? On the other hand, how can we attend to forms of disruption, intervention, and alternative museal practices within and outside of the institution that complicate and refuse its colonial ways of seeing and knowing? And what is the role of literature when engaging with these questions?

These are some of the key questions that we will tackle in this class focusing on two case studies: first, we will visit the "[Ts'uu Cedars: Of Trees and People](#)" exhibition, currently on display in the Humboldt Forum and co-curated by Daniela Kratzsch (Berlin-based) and Sean Young (Haida). Second, we will read Beth Piatote's (Nez Perce) play *Antikoni* that adapts Sophocles' Greek tragedy and places it in a contemporary US-American museal and legal context. Bringing together museum studies and literary studies, this class aims to give students the opportunity to practice their analytical skills by engaging both with an exhibition as a cultural text and with drama as another, literary, text form.

Our discussions will demand careful attention to situated knowledge (production) and the role of the reader/viewer as a co-producer of meaning. Students should be ready to approach the texts and exhibition with open-mindedness in order to challenge and critically rethink their own assumptions, and to join in a shared, respectful process of reflection and learning. To do so, students are asked to complete the readings and participate in in-class discussions.

Indian Poetry has existed in English as one of the most potent examples of colonialism in the Indian subcontinent. But what can this poetry tell us? In this introductory class about poetry, and more importantly, postcolonial poetry, we will be looking at Indian poetry's history by focussing on a poet in each class. Kommentar

The Humboldt Forum in Berlin is a highly contested institution of cultural memory organization and knowledge production. While long-standing critiques of the forum have engaged with Germany's colonial legacy in the context of, e.g., restituting the Benin bronzes or the display of the Papuan 'Luf-boat', in this class, we will turn our attention to the so-called North American exhibitions. These ethnological exhibitions have received relatively little public and scholarly attention within decolonization debates. Indeed, settler colonialism in North America is often framed as an 'un-German' matter that takes place 'over there', across the pond, and can thus be investigated from a supposedly detached 'outsider' perspective. Yet, these ethnological exhibitions are key to understanding Germany's implicatedness in settler colonialism in North America, both in material and narrative terms: such an understanding includes the removal of material belongings from Indigenous nations, often under structural conditions of duress (e.g. the Potlatch ban), for European collections (such as the Berliner Museum für Völkerkunde), as well as the power hierarchies that underpin matters of repatriation. It further includes the institution's complicity in perpetuating harmful narratives about history, land, colonization, and Indigeneity, as museums frequently reproduce stories of seemingly inevitable land and cultural loss in the face of the nation-state's 'progress', while their own "Indianthusiasm" (Lutz) goes largely unquestioned. Such a narrative distorts the realities of genocide and, in a self-serving manner, justifies museal practices of 'salvaging' and preserving material belongings of 'disappearing' cultures.

What does it then mean to read North America through and against the Humboldt Forum? What kind of situated reading practices does such an endeavor call for? On the one hand, how can we in this class work to dismantle the institution's colonial structures, practices, and stories embedded in its politics and ethics? On the other hand, how can we attend to forms of disruption, intervention, and alternative museal practices within and outside of the institution that complicate and refuse its colonial ways of seeing and knowing? And what is the role of literature when engaging with these questions?

These are some of the key questions that we will tackle in this class focusing on two case studies: first, we will visit the "[Ts'uu Cedars: Of Trees and People](#)" exhibition, currently on display in the Humboldt Forum and co-curated by Daniela Kratzsch (Berlin-based) and Sean Young (Haida). Second, we will read Beth Piatote's (Nez Perce) play *Antikoni* that adapts Sophocles' Greek tragedy and places it in a contemporary US-American museal and legal context. Bringing together museum studies and literary studies, this class aims to give students the opportunity to practice their analytical skills by engaging both with an exhibition as a cultural text and with drama as another, literary, text form.

Our discussions will demand careful attention to situated knowledge (production) and the role of the reader/viewer as a co-producer of meaning. Students should be ready to approach the texts and exhibition with open-mindedness in order to challenge and critically rethink their own assumptions, and to join in a shared, respectful process of reflection and learning. To do so, students are asked to complete the readings and participate in in-class discussions.

Kommentar

Kommentar

The Humboldt Forum in Berlin is a highly contested institution of cultural memory organization and knowledge production. While long-standing critiques of the forum have engaged with Germany's colonial legacy in the context of, e.g., restituting the Benin bronzes or the display of the Papuan 'Luf-boat', in this class, we will turn our attention to the so-called North American exhibitions. These ethnological exhibitions have received relatively little public and scholarly attention within decolonization debates. Indeed, settler colonialism in North America is often framed as an 'un-German' matter that takes place 'over there', across the pond, and can thus be investigated from a supposedly detached 'outsider' perspective. Yet, these ethnological exhibitions are key to understanding Germany's implicatedness in settler colonialism in North America, both in material and narrative terms: such an understanding includes the removal of material belongings from Indigenous nations, often under structural conditions of duress (e.g. the Potlatch ban), for European collections (such as the Berliner Museum für Völkerkunde), as well as the power hierarchies that underpin matters of repatriation. It further includes the institution's complicity in perpetuating harmful narratives about history, land, colonization, and Indigeneity, as museums frequently reproduce stories of seemingly inevitable land and cultural loss in the face of the nation-state's 'progress', while their own "Indianthiasm" (Lutz) goes largely unquestioned. Such a narrative distorts the realities of genocide and, in a self-serving manner, justifies museal practices of 'salvaging' and preserving material belongings of 'disappearing' cultures.

What does it then mean to read North America through and against the Humboldt Forum? What kind of situated reading practices does such an endeavor call for? On the one hand, how can we in this class work to dismantle the institution's colonial structures, practices, and stories embedded in its politics and ethics? On the other hand, how can we attend to forms of disruption, intervention, and alternative museal practices within and outside of the institution that complicate and refuse its colonial ways of seeing and knowing? And what is the role of literature when engaging with these questions?

These are some of the key questions that we will tackle in this class focusing on two case studies: first, we will visit the "[Ts'uu Cedars: Of Trees and People](#)" exhibition, currently on display in the Humboldt Forum and co-curated by Daniela Kratzsch (Berlin-based) and Sean Young (Haida). Second, we will read Beth Piatote's (Nez Perce) play *Antikoni* that adapts Sophocles' Greek tragedy and places it in a contemporary US-American museal and legal context. Bringing together museum studies and literary studies, this class aims to give students the opportunity to practice their analytical skills by engaging both with an exhibition as a cultural text and with drama as another, literary, text form.

Our discussions will demand careful attention to situated knowledge (production) and the role of the reader/viewer as a co-producer of meaning. Students should be ready to approach the texts and exhibition with open-mindedness in order to challenge and critically rethink their own assumptions, and to join in a shared, respectful process of reflection and learning. To do so, students are asked to complete the readings and participate in in-class discussions.

Kommentar

Captivity narratives are regarded as one of the earliest American genres (within the settler colonial narrative tradition), proliferating between the 17th and 19th centuries. The texts we will read in this class are a vital part of American literature and were influential in subsequent literary creation and national culture. The narratives were filtered through different religious denominations, functioning as catalytic texts that reinforced institutionalized beliefs. In representing disparate cultural systems, captivity narratives were an important vehicle for community formation. In the seminar, we will trace the development and changes of these narratives from early Puritan texts to contemporary adaptations. We will examine the redefinition of this genre, which, in its broadest sense, has come to include slave narratives as well as alien abduction stories.

Kommentar

The Humboldt Forum in Berlin is a highly contested institution of cultural memory organization and knowledge production. While long-standing critiques of the forum have engaged with Germany's colonial legacy in the context of, e.g., restituting the Benin bronzes or the display of the Papuan 'Luf-boat', in this class, we will turn our attention to the so-called North American exhibitions. These ethnological exhibitions have received relatively little public and scholarly attention within decolonization debates. Indeed, settler colonialism in North America is often framed as an 'un-German' matter that takes place 'over there', across the pond, and can thus be investigated from a supposedly detached 'outsider' perspective. Yet, these ethnological exhibitions are key to understanding Germany's implicatedness in settler colonialism in North America, both in material and narrative terms: such an understanding includes the removal of material belongings from Indigenous nations, often under structural conditions of duress (e.g. the Potlatch ban), for European collections (such as the Berliner Museum für Völkerkunde), as well as the power hierarchies that underpin matters of repatriation. It further includes the institution's complicity in perpetuating harmful narratives about history, land, colonization, and Indigeneity, as museums frequently reproduce stories of seemingly inevitable land and cultural loss in the face of the nation-state's 'progress', while their own "Indianthusiasm" (Lutz) goes largely unquestioned. Such a narrative distorts the realities of genocide and, in a self-serving manner, justifies museal practices of 'salvaging' and preserving material belongings of 'disappearing' cultures.

What does it then mean to read North America through and against the Humboldt Forum? What kind of situated reading practices does such an endeavor call for? On the one hand, how can we in this class work to dismantle the institution's colonial structures, practices, and stories embedded in its politics and ethics? On the other hand, how can we attend to forms of disruption, intervention, and alternative museal practices within and outside of the institution that complicate and refuse its colonial ways of seeing and knowing? And what is the role of literature when engaging with these questions?

These are some of the key questions that we will tackle in this class focusing on two case studies: first, we will visit the "[Ts'uu Cedars: Of Trees and People](#)" exhibition, currently on display in the Humboldt Forum and co-curated by Daniela Kratzsch (Berlin-based) and Sean Young (Haida). Second, we will read Beth Piatote's (Nez Perce) play *Antikoni* that adapts Sophocles' Greek tragedy and places it in a contemporary US-American museal and legal context. Bringing together museum studies and literary studies, this class aims to give students the opportunity to practice their analytical skills by engaging both with an exhibition as a cultural text and with drama as another, literary, text form.

Our discussions will demand careful attention to situated knowledge (production) and the role of the reader/viewer as a co-producer of meaning. Students should be ready to approach the texts and exhibition with open-mindedness in order to challenge and critically rethink their own assumptions, and to join in a shared, respectful process of reflection and learning. To do so, students are asked to complete the readings and participate in in-class discussions.
