Lerninhalte:

This two-hour writing course centers on the response paper. Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able

- to express themselves clearly at the sentence and paragraph levels
- to utilize critical reading skills for their academic writing
- to differentiate between conventions in spoken and written English
- to comprehend and correctly utilize lexical, grammatical, and organizational patterns of effective written communication
- to draft, evaluate, and edit their own and others' texts effectively (peer review)

The representation of space tethers the imagination of a reader to the ways in which a writer represents the many aspects of a society that they are trying to depict. Hence, understanding the representation of space is one of the most significant ways of mapping the concerns of a novel. In this semester, we will be reading theories of space—its organisation, representation, poetics—alongside the way the novelist R.K.Narayan's most significant creation—the fictional village of Malgudi. In this class, we will be reading about the fictional village of Malgudi as the very real site where Narayan depicted the problems, politics, and transformations of the Indian nation-state. What can this depiction of space tell us about the politics? And more significantly, how can we think of this politics by thinking about the representations of space?

Each week, we will read a theoretical text which will deal with the depiction of space and then try to apply it to the reading of Malgudi as the space where the imaginary of a colonial and then an anti-colonial politics collides. **For the classes, students would be expected to read both the theoretical texts and selected excerpts from the novels of R.K.Narayan every week, which would be made available on Moodle. Kommentar

The representation of space tethers the imagination of a reader to the ways in which a writer represents the many aspects of a society that they are trying to depict. Hence, understanding the representation of space is one of the most significant ways of mapping the concerns of a novel. In this semester, we will be reading theories of space—its organisation, representation, poetics—alongside the way the novelist R.K.Narayan's most significant creation—the fictional village of Malgudi. In this class, we will be reading about the fictional village of Malgudi as the very real site where Narayan depicted the problems, politics, and transformations of the Indian nation-state. What can this depiction of space tell us about the politics? And more significantly, how can we think of this politics by thinking about the representations of space?

Each week, we will read a theoretical text which will deal with the depiction of space and then try to apply it to the reading of Malgudi as the space where the imaginary of a colonial and then an anti-colonial politics collides. **For the classes, students would be expected to read both the theoretical texts and selected excerpts from the novels of R.K.Narayan every week, which would be made available on Moodle. Novels that will definitely be discussed: *Sampath, the Printer of Malgudi* and *Waiting for the Mahatma*.**

The representation of space tethers the imagination of a reader to the ways in which a writer represents the many aspects of a society that they are trying to depict. Hence, understanding the representation of space is one of the most significant ways of mapping the concerns of a novel. In this semester, we will be reading theories of space—its organisation, representation, poetics—alongside the way the novelist R.K.Narayan's most significant creation—the fictional village of Malgudi. In this class, we will be reading about the fictional village of Malgudi as the very real site where Narayan depicted the problems, politics, and transformations of the Indian nation-state. What can this depiction of space tell us about the politics? And more significantly, how can we think of this politics by thinking about the representations of space? Kommentar							
In early modern Europe the devil was allowed enormous intellectual and physical powers. Both popular belief and learned theology told of an original fall from divine favour that nevertheless left Satan's angelic advantages more or less intact. He was therefore believed to be strong in relation to humans, on whom he worked demonic magic and seduced them into sin and damnation; but weak in relation to God, whose hierarchical world system he could only oppose but not actually overthrow. In our seminar, we will take a look at some of the ways in which early modern English writers profiled the devil as an eminently dangerous and at the same time inherently oppositional and subordinate figure that in some instances appears surprisingly appealing and even likeable. We will read and discuss dramatic, poetic and narrative texts including Christopher Marlowe's tragedy <i>Doctor Faustus</i> (first performed in 1589) and Ben Jonson's comedy <i>The Devil Is an Ass</i> (premiered 1616) as well as extensive extracts from John Milton's epic poem, <i>Paradise Lost</i> (1667) and Daniel Defoe's mock-treatise, <i>A Political History of the Devil</i> (1726).
